Play it Safe

- Find Safe & Legal Access
- Wear a life jacket
- Watch for Boats & Nets



Wear it!

Remember to stay safe! Access the river at permitted points and do not trespass. Watch your footing and wear a life jacket when on a boat or near fast-moving water.

Be aware that there is angling and/or netting of salmon on the Fraser River many months of the year. In addition to swift and unpredictable currents, concentrations of boat traffic and fishing nets can be hazardous to navigation.

It's important to be attentive and steer wide of fishing boats, set nets (stationary gillnets visible by their floats) and drift nets (attached to a moving boat). A drifting boat, particularly one with a net attached, cannot stop or turn quickly. An anchored boat can be slow to avoid hazards. Wading anglers are susceptible to the wash from moving boats.
